2. Site Preparation & Setup

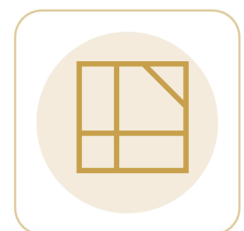
Before building begins, the site is prepared and secured.
